

ORDINANCE 1-20

An ordinance amending the 2019 annual appropriations for the Village of Covington, Ohio

WHEREAS it is necessary to amend the 2019 appropriations ordinance, 9-19, passed on March 18, 2019 (attached as Exhibit A) to adjust certain accounts to accurately reflect the 2019 calendar year appropriations to include the following changes;

Amend appropriations by increasing the appropriations for the Fire and EMS fund (15) from \$96,000 to \$96,487, an increase of \$487. This amendment is necessary because expenditures cannot exceed appropriations.

Amend estimated revenue by decreasing the estimated revenue for the capital revenue fund (40) acct from \$103,000 to \$71,937, a reduction of \$31,063. This amendment is required due to not receiving the full budgeted amount from Street Improvement assessments. A budgeted transfer of \$5,000 into this account was also unnecessary. The total available resources appropriated including cash on hand for the capital revenue fund for budget year 2019 is amended to \$105,318.

Amend appropriations by decreasing the appropriations for the capital expense fund (40) acct from \$135,000 to \$98,855, a reduction of \$36,145. This amendment is necessary because expense appropriations cannot exceed resources.

Amend estimated revenue by decreasing the estimated revenue for the Sewer Revenue fund (52) from \$885,000 to \$861,133 a reduction of \$23,867. This amendment is required due to not receiving the budgeted amounts from sewer collection revenue. The total available resources appropriated including cash on hand for the sewer revenue fund for budget year 2019 is amended to \$ 1,305,874.

Amend appropriations by decreasing the appropriations for the Sewer Expense fund (52) from \$1,314,900 to \$955,314, a reduction of \$359,586. This amendment is necessary because expense appropriations cannot exceed resources.

Amend estimated revenue by increasing the estimated revenue for the Trash Revenue fund (54) from \$277,000 to \$330,992 an increase of \$53,992. This amendment is required due to receiving unbudgeted revenue from the financing of a new woodchipper and the unbudgeted sale of the used woodchipper. The total available resources appropriated including cash on hand for the trash revenue fund for budget year 2019 is amended to \$ 360,742.

Amend appropriations by increasing the appropriations for the Trash Expense fund (54) from \$306,200 to \$315,618, an increase of \$9,418. This amendment is necessary because expenditures cannot exceed appropriations.

BE IT ORDAINED by the legislative authority of the Village of Covington, State of Ohio, a majority of all members elected thereto concurring, that:

Section I: The appropriations set forth in ordinance 9-19 attached as Exhibit A shall be hereby amended to reflect the changes in appropriations as shown in attached Exhibit B.


Section II. Upon passage of this ordinance, the sections of ordinance 9-19 that are amended shall be repealed and replaced with the amendments thereto made.

Section III: This ordinance provides for appropriations for the current expenses of the village and shall take effect immediately upon passage as provided by law.




AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE APPROPRIATIONS FOR CURRENT EXPENSES AND

DURING THE FISCAL YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31, 2019


BE IT ORDAINED by the legislative authority of the Village of Covington, State of

Amend appropriations by increasing the appropriations for the Fire and EMS fund (15) from \$96,000 to \$96,487, an increase of \$487. This amendment is necessary because expenditures cannot exceed appropriations.

Amend estimated revenue by decreasing the estimated revenue for the capital revenue fund (40) acct from \$103,000 to \$71,937, a reduction of \$31,063. This amendment is required due to not receiving the full budgeted amount from Street Improvement assessments. A budgeted transfer of \$5,000 into this account was also unnecessary. The total available resources appropriated including cash on hand for the capital revenue fund for budget year 2019 is amended to \$105,318.

Amend appropriations by decreasing the appropriations for the capital expense fund (40) acct from \$135,000 to \$98,855, a reduction of \$36,145. This amendment is necessary because expense appropriations cannot exceed resources.

Amend estimated revenue by decreasing the estimated revenue for the Sewer Revenue fund (52) from \$885,000 to \$861,133 a reduction of \$23,867. This amendment is required due to not receiving the budgeted amounts from sewer collection revenue. The total available resources appropriated including cash on hand for the sewer revenue fund for budget year 2019 is amended to \$ 1,305,874.

Amend appropriations by decreasing the appropriations for the Sewer Expense fund (52) from \$1,314,900 to \$955,314, a reduction of \$359,586. This amendment is necessary because expense appropriations cannot exceed resources.

Amend estimated revenue by increasing the estimated revenue for the Trash Revenue fund (54) from \$277,000 to \$330,992 an increase of \$53,992. This amendment is required due to receiving unbudgeted revenue from the financing of a new woodchipper and the unbudgeted sale of the used woodchipper. The total available resources appropriated including cash on hand for the trash revenue fund for budget year 2019 is amended to \$ 360,742.

Amend appropriations by increasing the appropriations for the Trash Expense fund (54) from \$306,200 to \$315,618, an increase of \$9,418. This amendment is necessary because expenditures cannot exceed appropriations.



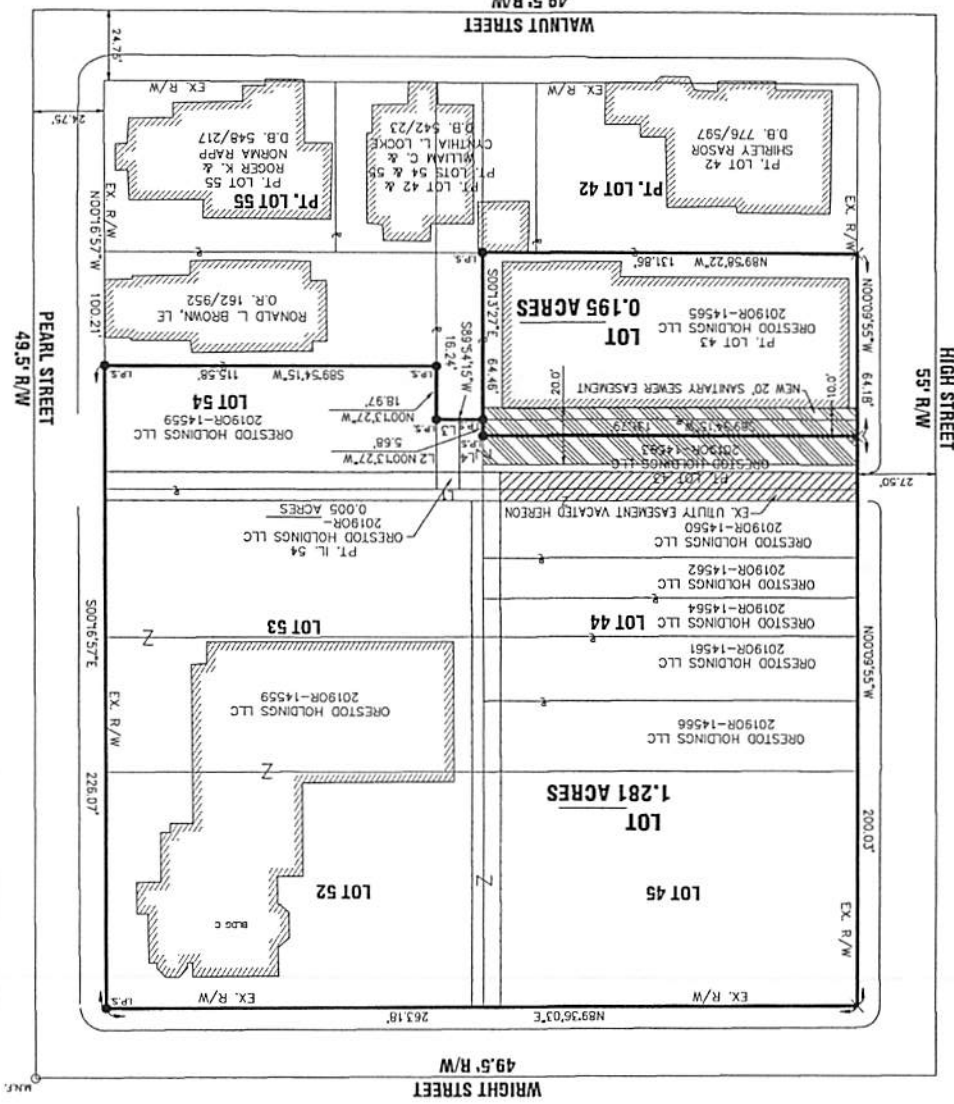

ORDINANCE NO. 5-20

AN ORDINANCE APPROVING, ADOPTING AND ENACTING AMERICAN LEGAL PUBLISHING'S OHIO BASIC CODE, 2020 EDITION, AS THE CODE OF ORDINANCES FOR THE MUNICIPALITY OF Covington, OHIO, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, the present general and permanent ordinances of the municipality are inadequately arranged and classified and are insufficient in form and substance for the complete preservation of the public peace, health, safety and general welfare of the municipality and for the proper conduct of its affairs.

WHEREAS, American Legal Publishing Corporation publishes a Code of Ordinances suitable for adoption by municipalities in Ohio.

WHEREAS, it is necessary to provide for the usual daily operation of the municipality and for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, safety and general welfare of the municipality that this ordinance take effect at an early date.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE LEGISLATIVE AUTHORITY OF THE MUNICIPALITY OF Covington, OHIO:

Section 1. American Legal Publishing's Ohio Basic Code, 2020 Edition, as reviewed and approved by the Legislative Authority, is hereby adopted and enacted. Any prior version of the Ohio Basic Code which may have been previously adopted by the municipality is hereby repealed as obsolete and is hereby replaced in its entirety by this Ohio Basic Code, 2020 Edition.

Section 2. One copy of American Legal Publishing's Ohio Basic Code, 2020 Edition, certified as correct by the Mayor and Clerk of the Legislative Authority, as required by Ohio Revised Code § 731.23, shall be kept in its initial form on file in the office of the Clerk of the municipality and retained as a permanent ordinance record of the municipality. The Clerk of the municipality is authorized and directed to publish a summary of all new matters contained in the Code of Ordinances as required by Ohio Revised Code § 731.23. Such summary is attached hereto and marked as "Exhibit A".

Section 3. All ordinances and resolutions or parts thereof which are in conflict or inconsistent with any provision of the Ohio Basic Code, 2020 Edition, as adopted in Section 1 hereof, are hereby repealed as of the effective date of this ordinance, except as follows:

(A) The enactment of the Ohio Basic Code, 2020 Edition, shall not be construed to affect a right or liability accrued or incurred under any legislative provision prior to the effective date of such enactment, or an action or proceeding for the enforcement of such right or liability. Such enactment shall not be construed to relieve any person from punishment for an act committed in violation of any such legislative provision, nor to affect an indictment or prosecution therefor. For such purposes, any such legislative provision shall continue in full force notwithstanding its repeal for the purpose of revision and codification.

(B) The repeal provided above shall not affect:

- (1) The grant or creation of a franchise, license, right, easement or privilege;
- (2) The purchase, sale, lease or transfer of property;
- (3) The appropriation or expenditure of money or promise or guarantee of payment;
- (4) The assumption of any contract or obligation;
- (5) The issuance and delivery of any bonds, obligations or other instruments of indebtedness;
- (6) The levy or imposition of taxes, assessments or charges;
- (7) The establishment, naming, vacating or grade level of any street or public way;
- (8) The dedication of property or plat approval;
- (9) The annexation or detachment of territory;
- (10) Any legislation enacted subsequent to the adoption of this ordinance.
- (11) Any legislation specifically superseding the provision of the Ohio Basic Code.

Section 4. Whenever reference is made in any documents, publications, or signs of the municipality, including but not limited to traffic tickets and traffic-control signs, to a section as it existed in a former edition of the Ohio Basic Code, the reference shall extend and apply to the section referred to as subsequently amended, revised, recodified, or renumbered.

Section 5. This ordinance is declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the peace, health, safety and general welfare of the people of this municipality, and shall take effect at the earliest date provided by law.

ORDINANCE 7-20

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE OPERATION OF MINI-TRUCKS AND LOW-SPEED, UNDER- SPEED, OR UTILITY VEHICLES.

WHEREAS, the Council of the Village of Covington wishes to regulate the operation of mini-trucks and low speed vehicles; and

WHEREAS, the Council of the Village of Covington wishes to require inspections for proper safety equipment on these mini-trucks and low speed vehicles.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the legislative authority of the Village of Covington, State of Ohio, and a majority of the members elected thereto concurring:

SEC.1: That Mini-Trucks and low speed vehicles be regulated as follows:

(A) Equipment.

(1) Low speed vehicles, under-speed vehicles, and mini-trucks operated on the streets, highways, and public property within the corporate limits of the village, shall have a minimum of the following functional equipment thereon:

- (a) At least one working rear red colored tail light;
- (b) A License plate clearly displayed on the rear of the low-speed or under-speed vehicle, bracketed to the vehicle;
- (c) At least two working brake lights;
- (d) Two headlights, white or clear in color;
- (e) A rearview mirror;
- (f) A windshield;
- (g) Turn signals;
- (h) A horn;
- (i) Brakes sufficient to stop within 40 feet;
- (j) An emergency brake sufficient to hold the vehicle on any grade;
- (k) A properly working steering mechanism;
- (l) Appropriate tires free of major bumps, bulges, breaks, or other unsafe condition;
- (m) Working exhaust system if the vehicle has an internal combustion engine.

(B) Licensing requirements of operator.

(1) The operator of a low speed vehicle, under-speed vehicle, or mini-truck on public roadways or on public property within the corporate limits of the village shall have a valid driver's license;

- (2) The operator of a low speed vehicle, under-speed vehicle, or mini-truck on public roadways or on public property in the village shall be no less than 16 years of age.
- (C) Insurance requirements of owner and operator.
- (1) The owner of a low speed vehicle, under-speed vehicle, or mini-truck that is driven on public roadways or on public property within the corporate limits of the village shall maintain proof of financial responsibility thereon as required by the Ohio Revised Code.
 - (2) The operator of a low speed vehicle, under-speed vehicle, or mini-truck that is driven on public roadways or on public property within the corporate limits of the village shall have in his possession proof of insurance while operating the low speed vehicle, under-speed vehicle, or mini-truck.
- (D) Inspection and title requirements.
- (1) No person shall operate a low speed vehicle, under-speed vehicle, or mini-truck on public roadways or on public property within the corporate limits of the village without first obtaining an inspection by the Chief of Police of the village, or the law enforcement official of another jurisdiction within the State of Ohio.
 - (2) No person shall operate a low speed vehicle, under-speed vehicle, or mini-truck on the public roadways or on public property within the corporate limits of the village without permanently displaying a sticker/decal issued by the inspecting authority on the low speed vehicle, under-speed vehicle, or mini-truck.
 - (3) No person shall operate a low speed vehicle, under-speed vehicle, or mini-truck on public roadways or on public property within the corporate limits of the village without first obtaining a Certificate of Title from the Clerk of Courts.
 - (4) If the Chief of Police of the village, or his designee, or another agent designated and approved by the State of Ohio, determines that the low speed vehicle, under-speed vehicle, or mini-truck complies with the State of Ohio's statutory requirements that are applicable to motor vehicles, the Chief of Police of the village shall issue the owner or operator a certificate of compliance entitling the owner or operator to operate the low speed vehicle, under-speed vehicle, or mini-truck on the streets within the corporate limits of the village. The owner or operator shall also show the Chief of Police of the village or his designee, proof of liability insurance for the low speed vehicle, under-speed vehicle, or mini-truck before a certificate of compliance is issued. The owner or operator of any low speed vehicle, under-speed vehicle, or mini-truck shall be required to pay a fee in the amount of \$20 to the village through the Police Department of the village before the low speed vehicle, under-speed vehicle, or mini-truck may be operated on the streets of the corporate limits of the village. Any certificate issued pursuant to this section by the Chief of Police of the village shall expire upon the transfer or sale of the low speed vehicle, under-speed vehicle, or mini-truck. The Chief of Police of

the village shall keep a copy of each certificate issued pursuant to this section. The owner or operator of any low speed vehicle, under-speed vehicle, or mini-truck shall keep a copy of any certificate issued pursuant to this section inside the low speed vehicle, under-speed vehicle, or mini-truck to which it pertains. The Chief of Police of the village shall issue a sticker or other similar device to the owner of each low speed vehicle, under-speed vehicle, or mini-truck once it is inspected. The sticker shall signify compliance with this section. The owner of each low speed vehicle, under-speed vehicle or mini-truck shall display the sticker in a conspicuous place on the rear of the low speed vehicle, under-speed vehicle, or mini-truck.


- (E) Low speed vehicles, under-speed vehicles, and mini-trucks. No person shall operate a low speed vehicle, under-speed vehicle, or mini-truck upon any street within the corporate limits of the village where the posted speed limit exceeds 25 miles per hour, excepting that no low speed vehicle, under-speed vehicle, and mini-truck shall be operated on High St., Broadway, or Troy Pike.

An operator of a low speed vehicle, under-speed vehicle, or mini-truck may cross streets listed in this section only at intersections. The operator of a low speed vehicle, under-speed vehicle, or mini-truck shall comply with all other applicable traffic laws.

- (F) Utility vehicles.
- (1) A state park or political subdivision employee or volunteer may operate a utility vehicle exclusively within the boundaries of state parks or political subdivision parks for the operation or maintenance of state or political subdivision park facilities.
 - (2) A person may operate a utility vehicle on any public roads or right-of-way, other than a freeway, when traveling from one farm field to another for agricultural purposes if the vehicle is displaying a triangular slow-moving vehicle emblem as described in R.C. § 4513.11.
- (G) Except as otherwise provided, whoever violates any provision of this section is guilty of a minor misdemeanor. If within one year of the offense, the offender previously has been convicted of or pleaded guilty to one predicate motor vehicle or traffic offense, whoever violates this section is guilty of a misdemeanor of the fourth degree. If within one year of the offense, the offender previously has been convicted of two or more predicate motor vehicle or traffic offenses, whoever violates this section is guilty of a misdemeanor of the third degree.

SEC.2: That this Ordinance shall take effect as at the earliest time as provided by law.

ORDINANCE NO. 8-20

AN ORDINANCE IMPLEMENTING SECTIONS 3735.65 THROUGH 3735.70 OF THE OHIO REVISED CODE, ESTABLISHING AND DESCRIBING THE BOUNDARIES OF A COMMUNITY REINVESTMENT AREA IN THE VILLAGE OF COVINGTON, DESIGNATING A HOUSING OFFICER TO ADMINISTER THE PROGRAM, AND CREATING A COMMUNITY REINVESTMENT AREA HOUSING COUNCIL AND A TAX INCENTIVE REVIEW COUNCIL

WHEREAS, the Council of the Village of Covington, Ohio (hereinafter "Village Council") desires to pursue all reasonable and legitimate incentive measures to assist and encourage development in the Village of Covington that have not enjoyed reinvestment from remodeling or new construction;

WHEREAS, a survey of housing, a copy of which is on file in the Village office as required by Ohio Revised Code (ORC) Section 3735.66, has been prepared for the area to be included in the proposed Community Reinvestment Area;

WHEREAS, the remodeling of existing structures and the construction of new structures in such area would serve to encourage economic stability, maintain real property values, and generate new employment opportunities; and

WHEREAS, the remodeling of existing structures and the construction of new structures in this Community Reinvestment Area constitutes a public purpose for which real property exemptions may be granted.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, BY THE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF COVINGTON, MIAMI COUNTY, OHIO, AT LEAST TWO-THIRDS (2/3) OF THE MEMBERS ELECTED THERETO CONCURRING:

Section 1: The area designated as the Covington Community Reinvestment Area constitutes an area in which housing facilities or structures of historical significance are located, and in which new construction or remodeling of existing structures has been discouraged.

Section 2: Pursuant to ORC Section 3735.66, the Covington Community Reinvestment Area is hereby established in the following described area:

All of the parcels located within the village's limits, with the exclusion of all parcels specifically identified as being a part of the Village of Covington Downtown Redevelopment District.

The Community Reinvestment Area is approximately depicted as the crosshatched area on the map attached to this Ordinance as Exhibit A, and by this reference is incorporated herein.

Only residential, commercial and/or industrial properties consistent with the applicable zoning regulations within the designated Community Reinvestment Area will be eligible for exemptions under this Program.

Section 3: All properties identified in Exhibit A as being within the designated Community Reinvestment Area are eligible for this incentive. This proposal is a public/private partnership intended to promote and expand conforming uses in the designated area. As part of the project, the Village of Covington intends to undertake supporting public improvements in the designated area.

Section 4: Within the Community Reinvestment Area, the percentage of the tax exemption on the increase in the assessed valuation resulting from improvements to commercial and industrial real property and the term of those exemptions shall be negotiated on a case-by-case basis in advance of construction or remodeling occurring according to the rules outlined in ORC Section 3765.67. The results of the negotiation as approved by Village Council will be set in writing in a Community Reinvestment Area Agreement as outlined in ORC Section 3735.671. For residential property, a tax exemption on the increase in the assessed valuation resulting from the improvements as described in ORC Section 3735.67 shall be granted upon application by the property owner and certification thereof by the designated Housing Officer. The period of the tax exemption granted and the percentage of the tax exemption for the remodeling or new construction of residential, commercial and industrial properties are as follows:

- a. For the remodeling of every residential dwelling unit containing not more than two (2) housing units or for a newly constructed or remodeled accessory structure located on the same lot as the primary housing unit and upon which the cost of the improvements is at least \$20,000, as described in ORC Section 3735.67, the tax exemption shall be granted for a period of five (5) years with such exemption being equal to one hundred percent (100%) of the increase in the assessed valuation resulting from such improvements for each of the five (5) years.
- b. For the remodeling of every residential dwelling unit containing more than two (2) housing units but 4 or fewer housing units, or for a newly constructed or remodeled accessory structure located on the same lot as the primary housing units and upon which the cost of the remodeling is at least \$20,000, as described in ORC Section 3735.67, the tax exemption shall be granted for a period of five (5) years with such exemption being equal to one hundred percent (100%) of the

increase in the assessed valuation resulting from such improvements for each of the five (5) years.

- c. For the construction of residential dwellings containing not more than one housing unit and upon which the cost of the new construction is at least \$180,000, as described in ORC Section 3735.67, the tax exemption shall be granted for a period of five (5) years with such exemption being equal to one hundred percent (100%) of the first Four Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$400,000) of the increase in assessed valuation resulting from such new construction for each of the five (5) years.
- d. For the remodeling of existing commercial facilities and upon which the cost of remodeling is at least \$20,000, as described in ORC Section 3735.67, the term and percentage of the tax exemption shall be negotiated on a case-by-case basis in advance of the commencement of the remodeling, with the maximum term of such exemption being a period of ten (10) years and the maximum exemption being equal to one hundred percent (100%) of the increase in the assessed valuation resulting from such improvements.
- e. For the remodeling of existing industrial facilities and upon which the cost of remodeling is at least \$50,000, as described in ORC Section 3735.67, the term and percentage of the tax exemption shall be negotiated on a case-by-case basis in advance of the commencement of the remodeling, with the maximum term of such exemption being a period of ten (10) years and the maximum exemption being equal to one hundred percent (100%) of the increase in the assessed valuation resulting from such improvements.
- f. For the construction of new commercial or industrial facilities, the term and percentage of the tax exemption shall be negotiated on a case-by-case basis in advance of the commencement of the construction, with the maximum term of such exemption being a period of ten (10) years and the maximum exemption being equal to one hundred percent (100%) of the increase in the assessed valuation resulting from such new construction.

For the purposes of the above described Community Reinvestment Area, structures exclusively used for residential purposes and composed of four (4) and fewer housing units shall be classified as residential structures, and structures exclusively used for residential purposes and composed of more than four (4) housing units shall be classified as commercial structures.

If remodeling qualifies for an exemption, during the period of the exemption, the exempted percentage multiplied by the dollar amount of the increase in the assessed valuation of the structure resulting from such improvements shall be exempt from real property taxation.

If new residential construction qualifies for an exemption, during the period of the exemption, the first \$400,000 of valuation of the residential dwelling shall not be considered to be an improvement on the real property on which the dwelling is located for the purpose of real property taxation.

Section 5: All commercial and industrial projects are required to comply with the state application fee requirement of ORC Section 3735.672(C) and the local annual monitoring fee of one percent of the amount of taxes exempted under the Community Reinvestment Area Agreement, with a minimum monitoring fee of \$500 annually up to a maximum monitoring fee of \$2,500 annually, unless otherwise waived by the Village Council.

Section 6: To administer and implement the provisions of this Ordinance, the Village Administrator is designated as the Housing Officer as described in ORC Section 3735.65 through 3735.70.

Section 7: A Community Reinvestment Area Housing Council (hereinafter "CRA Housing Council") shall be created, consisting of two members appointed by the Mayor of Covington, two members appointed by the Village Council, and one member appointed by the Planning Commission of Covington. The majority of the members shall then appoint two additional members who shall be residents within the Community Reinvestment Area. Terms of the members of the CRA Housing Council shall be for three years. An unexpired term resulting from a vacancy in the CRA Housing Council shall be filled in the same manner as the initial appointment was made.

A Tax Incentive Review Council shall be established pursuant to ORC Section 5709.85 and shall consist of three representatives appointed by the Board of County Commissioners, two representatives of the Village of Covington appointed by the Mayor of Covington with Village Council concurrence, the County Auditor or its designee and a representative of each affected Board of Education. At least two members must be residents of the Village of Covington. The Tax Incentive Review Council shall review annually the compliance of all Community Reinvestment Area Agreements involving the granting of exemptions for commercial or industrial real property improvements under ORC Section 3735.671, and make written recommendations to the Village Council as to continuing, modifying or terminating said Community Reinvestment Area Agreements based upon the performance of the terms of the Community Reinvestment Area Agreements.

Section 8: The Village Council, pursuant to the annual TIRC review set forth in Section 7 reserves the right to re-evaluate the designation of the Covington Community Reinvestment Area on an annual basis beginning December 31, 2020, at which time the Village Council may direct the Housing Officer not to accept any new applications for exemptions as described in ORC Section 3735.67.

Section 9: The CRA Housing Council shall make an annual inspection of the properties within the Community Reinvestment Area for which an exemption has been granted under ORC Section 3735.67. The CRA Housing Council shall also hear appeals under ORC Section 3735.70.

Section 10: The Village Council hereby finds and determines that all formal actions relative to the passage of this Ordinance were taken in open meetings of Village Council, that all deliberations of Village Council and of its committees, if any, which resulted in formal action were taken in meetings open to the public, in full compliance with the applicable legal requirements, including ORC Section 121.22.

Section 11: This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law and upon confirmation by the Director of Ohio Development Services Agency of the findings in this Ordinance.

Section 12: The Mayor of the Village of Covington is hereby directed and authorized to petition the Director of Ohio Development Services Agency to confirm the findings contained within this Ordinance.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT **ORDAINED** BY THE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF COVINGTON, OHIO AS FOLLOWS:

Section I: The COVID-19 employee leave policy for no elected village employees attached as exhibit A is hereby adopted and is deemed to be retroactive to April 1, 2020 and remain in effect through December 31, 2020.

Section III: This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

EMPLOYEE RIGHTS

PAID SICK LEAVE AND EXPANDED FAMILY AND MEDICAL LEAVE UNDER THE FAMILIES FIRST CORONAVIRUS RESPONSE ACT

The Families First Coronavirus Response Act (FFCRA or Act) requires certain employers to provide their employees with paid sick leave and expanded family and medical leave for specified reasons related to COVID-19. These provisions will apply from April 1, 2020 through December 31, 2020.

► PAID LEAVE ENTITLEMENTS

Generally, employers covered under the Act must provide employees:

Up to two weeks (80 hours, or a part-time employee's two-week equivalent) of paid sick leave based on the higher of their regular rate of pay, or the applicable state or Federal minimum wage, paid at:

- 100% for qualifying reasons #1-3 below, up to \$511 daily and \$5,110 total;
- ⅔ for qualifying reasons #4 and 6 below, up to \$200 daily and \$2,000 total; and
- Up to 10 weeks more of paid sick leave and expanded family and medical leave paid at ⅓ for qualifying reason #5 below for up to \$200 daily and \$12,000 total.

A part-time employee is eligible for leave for the number of hours that the employee is normally scheduled to work over that period.

► ELIGIBLE EMPLOYEES

In general, employees of private sector employers with fewer than 500 employees, and certain public sector employers, are eligible for up to two weeks of fully or partially paid sick leave for COVID-19 related reasons (see below). *Employees who have been employed for at least 30 days prior to their leave request may be eligible for up to an additional 10 weeks of partially paid expanded family and medical leave for reason #5 below.*

► QUALIFYING REASONS FOR LEAVE RELATED TO COVID-19

An employee is entitled to take leave related to COVID-19 if the employee is unable to work, including unable to telework, because the employee:

► ENFORCEMENT

The U.S. Department of Labor's Wage and Hour Division (WHD) has the authority to investigate and enforce compliance with the FFCRA. Employers may not discharge, discipline, or otherwise discriminate against any employee who lawfully takes paid sick leave or expanded family and medical leave under the FFCRA, files a complaint, or institutes a proceeding under or related to this Act. Employers in violation of the provisions of the FFCRA will be subject to penalties and enforcement by WHD.

FAMILIES FIRST CORONAVIRUS RESPONSE ACT POLICY

FAMILY AND MEDICAL LEAVE EXPANSION AND EMERGENCY SICK LEAVE

Effective April 1, 2020, and ending on December 31, 2020, employees will be entitled to the limited use, expanded leave in the following manner:

I. Family and Medical Leave Expansion- “Public Health Emergency Leave”

The Employer’s Family and Medical Leave Policy is hereby amended to include eligible employees who, because of a qualifying need related to a public health emergency, have need to avail themselves of “Public Health Emergency Leave,” as defined below.

- A. An eligible employee is entitled to take up to twelve (12) weeks of Family and Medical Leave if such leave is for a qualifying need related to the COVID-19/Coronavirus public health emergency. An employee becomes eligible for public health emergency leave after being employed for at least 30 calendar days by the Employer.
- B. Public Health Emergency leave will only be for a qualifying need related to a public health emergency. The only qualifying need related to a public health emergency recognized by this policy is if an employee is unable to work (or telework) due to a need for leave to care for the son or daughter under 18 years of age of such employee if the school or place of care has been closed, or the child care provider of such son or daughter is unavailable, due to a public health emergency.
- C. Public Health Emergency Leave will consist of unpaid leave for the first ten (10) days a qualified employee take public health emergency leave. An employee may elect to substitute any accrued vacation leave, personal leave, or medical or sick leave for unpaid leave during the first ten (10) days of public health emergency leave.
- D. After the first ten (10) days of public health leave, the Employer shall provide paid leave for each day of public health emergency leave remaining of the employee’s overall FMLA entitlement that an employee takes after taking leave under such section for the ten (10) days. The Employer cannot require the employee to utilize any accrued but unused paid leave from the employee’s balances during the term of public health leave.
 - 1. Full Time Employees. The amount of pay that an eligible full-time employee may receive, as provided in the previous paragraph, will be calculated based on an amount that is not less than two-thirds (2/3) of an employee’s regular rate of pay; and the number of hours the employee would otherwise be normally scheduled to work.
 - 2. Part Time Employees. The amount of pay that an eligible part-time employees or employees with varying schedules may receive will be calculated based upon an amount that is not less than two-thirds (2/3) of an employees regular rate of pay

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and the number of hours the employee would otherwise be normally scheduled to work.

To the an extent that the Employer is unable to determine with certainty the number of hours the employee would have worked if such employee had not taken public health emergency leave or other leave, the Employer shall use the following in place of such number:

- a. If the employee worked over the past six (6) months, a number equal to the average number of hours that the employee was scheduled per day over the six (6) month period ending on the date on which the employee takes such leave, including hours for which the employee took leave of any type.
 - b. If the employee did not work over the past six (6) months, the reasonable expectation of the employee at the time of hiring of the average number of hours per day that the employee would normally be scheduled to work.
3. Regardless of whether the employee is full-time, part-time, seasonal, or otherwise, in no event shall any pay in this policy for public health emergency leave exceed \$200 per day and \$10,000 in the aggregate.
- E. In any case where an employee has the necessity for public health emergency leave and the need is foreseeable, an employee shall provide the Employer with such notice of leave as soon as is practicable. The Employer will provide a form for such request that the employee must fill and return to the Employer as soon as is practicable. A failure to provide practicable notice may result in the employee being absent without approved leave.
- F. **Special Rule for Health Care Providers and Emergency Responders**
- An Employer of an employee who is a health care provider or an emergency responder may elect to exclude such employee from the application of the provisions in the amendments made under of section 3102 of this Act.
- The Employer has not elected, pursuant to the Family and Medical Leave Expansion Act to exclude health care providers and emergency responders from the application of the new public health emergency leave.
- G. Under the Family and Medical Leave Expansion Act, the requirements that an Employer restore an employee who returns from FMLA leave to his or her position or an equivalent one do not apply to Employers with fewer than 25 employees if certain conditions are met:
1. the employee takes public health emergency leave;

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2. the employee's position no longer exists due to economic conditions or other changes in the Employer's operating conditions that affect employment and are caused by the COVID-19/Coronavirus emergency;
3. the Employer makes reasonable efforts to restore the employee to an equivalent position; **and**
4. if the Employer cannot restore the employee to an equivalent position, the Employer makes reasonable efforts to contact the employee if an equivalent position becomes available during the "contact period." The "contact period" is one year from either (a) the date public health emergency leave ends, or (b) the date that is 12 weeks after public health emergency leave starts, whichever is earlier.

II. EMERGENCY PAID SICK LEAVE ACT LEAVE

- A. The Employer's Sick Leave Policy is hereby amended to include Emergency Paid Sick Leave to eligible employees who are unable to work or telework, due to a need for leave because
1. The employee is subject to a Federal, State, or local quarantine or isolation order related to COVID-19.
 2. The employee has been advised by a health care provider to self-quarantine due to concerns related to COVID-19.
 3. The employee is experiencing symptoms of COVID-19 and seeking a medical diagnosis.
 4. The employee is caring for an individual who is subject to an order as described in subparagraph (1) or has been advised as described in subparagraph (2).
 5. The employee is caring for a son or daughter of such employee if the school or place of care of the son or daughter has been closed, or the child care provider of such son or daughter is unavailable, due to COVID-19 precautions.
 6. The employee is experiencing any other substantially similar condition specified by the Secretary of Health and Human Services in consultation with the Secretary of the Treasury and the Secretary of Labor.

There is an exception that an Employer of an employee who is a health care provider or an emergency responder may elect to exclude such employees from the application of this subsection regarding Emergency Paid Sick Leave. The definition for emergency responder can be found in the definitions section at the end of this policy.

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The Employer has not elected, pursuant to the Emergency Paid Sick Leave Act to exclude health care providers and emergency responders from the application of the new public health emergency leave.

B. An employee shall be entitled to emergency paid sick leave for eighty (80) hours for full-time employees. For part-time employees, the employee will be entitled to a number of hours equal to the number of hours that such employee works, on average, over a two (2) week period. The paid sick leave under this policy shall be available for immediate use by the employee for the purposes described in this policy, regardless of how long the employee has been employed by an Employer. Emergency paid sick leave under this policy will be in addition to any accrued sick leave already accrued by an employee, and the use of emergency paid sick leave will not be deducted from an employee's existing sick leave accrual.

C. Emergency paid sick leave will be calculated pursuant to paragraph D below.

For full-time employees emergency paid sick leave will be calculated employees based upon the number of hours the employee would otherwise be normally scheduled to work at the employee's regular rate of pay.

For part-time employees paid leave will be calculated based upon the number of hours the employee would otherwise be normally scheduled to work at the employee's regular rate of pay. For part-time employees or employees with varying schedules, and to the extent that the Employer is unable to determine with certainty the number of hours the employee would have worked if such employee had not taken public health emergency leave or other leave, the Employer shall use the following in place of such number:

1. If the employee worked during the past six (6) months, a number equal to the average number of hours that the employee was scheduled per day over the six (6) month period ending on the date on which the employee takes such leave, including hours for which the employee took leave of any type.
2. If the employee did not work over the past six (6) months, the reasonable expectation of the employee at the time of hiring of the average number of hours per day that the employee would normally be scheduled to work.

D. With respect to any emergency paid sick leave provided for any use described in subsections A 4, 5, or 6 referenced above in this policy, the employee's required compensation under this subparagraph shall be two-thirds (2/3) of the amount described in Sections C and D of this policy.

Regardless of the employee's full or part-time status, in no event shall such paid sick time exceed:

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1. \$511 per day and \$5,110 in the aggregate for a use described in A 1, 2, or 3 as referenced above regarding qualifying reasons for emergency sick leave; and
 2. \$200 per day and \$2,000 in the aggregate for a use described in A 4, 5, or 6 as referenced above regarding qualifying reasons for emergency sick leave.
- E. An employee may first use the paid sick leave provided under this policy for the purposes described in this policy, and the Employer will not require an employee to use other paid leave provided by the Employer before the employee uses the emergency paid sick leave under this policy for the purposes specified above.
- F. Paid sick leave provided to an employee under this policy shall cease beginning with the employee's next scheduled shift immediately following the termination of the need for paid sick leave under this policy.
- G. Any employee requesting such leave provided in this section shall provide notice to the Employer as soon as is practicable that the employee requires the need for leave. The Employer will provide a form for the employee to complete designating the request for leave, and the type of leave to be requested. **A failure to provide practicable notice may result in the employee being absent without approved leave.**
- H. The Employer will not require, as a condition of providing Emergency Paid Sick Leave under this policy, that the employee involved search for or find a replacement employee to cover the hours during which the employee is using paid sick leave.
- I. Paid sick leave under this section shall not carry over from one year to the next.
- J. After the first workday (or portion thereof) an employee receives paid sick leave under this Act, the Employer will require the employee to follow reasonable notice procedures in order to continue receiving such paid sick leave.
- K. The Employer shall post and keep posted, in conspicuous places on the premises of the Employer where notices to employees are customarily posted, a notice, to be prepared or approved by the Secretary of Labor, of the requirements described in this Act.

DEFINITIONS

1. "Child care provider" means a provider who receives compensation for providing child care services on a regular basis.
2. "Eligible Employee" means an employee who has been employed for at least 30 calendar days by the Employer with respect to whom leave is requested.
3. "Health Care Provider" is anyone employed at any doctor's office, hospital, health care center, clinic, post-secondary educational institution offering health care instruction,

medical school, local health department or agency, nursing facility, retirement facility, nursing home, home health care provider, any facility that performs laboratory or medical testing, pharmacy, or any similar institution, employer, or entity. This includes any permanent or temporary institution, facility, location, or site where medical services are provided that are similar to such institutions.

This definition includes any individual employed by an entity that contracts with any of the above institutions, employers, or entities institutions to provide services or to maintain the operation of the facility. This also includes anyone employed by any entity that provides medical services, produces medical products, or is otherwise involved in the making of COVID-19 related medical equipment, tests, drugs, vaccines, diagnostic vehicles, or treatments. This also includes any individual that the highest official of a state or territory, including the District of Columbia, determines is a health care provider necessary for that state's or territory's or the District of Columbia's response to COVID-19.

4. "Emergency Responder" is an employee who is necessary for the provision of transport, care, health care, comfort, and nutrition of such patients, or whose services are otherwise needed to limit the spread of COVID-19. This includes but is not limited to military or national guard, law enforcement officers, correctional institution personnel, fire fighters, emergency medical services personnel, physicians, nurses, public health personnel, emergency medical technicians, paramedics, emergency management personnel, 911 operators, public works personnel, and persons with skills or training in operating specialized equipment or other skills needed to provide aid in a declared emergency as well as individuals who work for such facilities employing these individuals and whose work is necessary to maintain the operation of the facility. This also includes any individual that the highest official of a state or territory, including the District of Columbia, determines is an emergency responder necessary for that state's or territory's or the District of Columbia's response to COVID-19.
5. "Employer" means any public sector agency or any private sector entity with fewer than five hundred employees.
6. "Public Health Emergency" means an emergency with respect to COVID-19 declared by a Federal, State, or local authority.
7. "Public Health Emergency Leave" means a particular type of Family and Medical Leave that is in part unpaid and paid that qualified employees may utilize in response to the COVID-19/Coronavirus pandemic.
8. "Qualifying need related to a public health emergency" means that, for the purposes of the Family and Medical Leave Expansion Act, the employee is unable to work (or telework) due to a need for leave to care for the son or daughter under 18 years of age of such employee if the school or place of care has been closed, or the child care provider of such son or daughter is unavailable, due to a public health emergency.

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9. "School" means an elementary school or secondary school as such terms are defined in Section 8101 of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C. 7801).






NOW, THEREFORE, be it ordained by the Council of the Village of Covington, Miami County, Ohio, as follows:



**AN ORDINANCE REPEALING AND REPLACING THE SALARY
ORDINANCE FOR THE VILLAGE OF COVINGTON**

Whereas, it is necessary to establish a salary ordinance for all non-elected hourly employees of the Village of Covington.;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT **ORDAINED** BY THE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF COVINGTON, OHIO AS FOLLOWS:

Section I: All previous salary ordinances and their amendments attached hereto are repealed.

Section II: Required Certifications, Levels Defined.

1. Required Certificates

The Utility Operator 1 and the Utility Operator 2 shall prior to accepting said positions obtain and maintain water and/or wastewater certificates from the Ohio EPA equal to the Ohio EPA's classification of the water and wastewater treatment works in operation for the Village of Covington.

Truck Driver / Labors shall prior to accepting said position obtain and maintain a class B CDL.

Failure to obtain or maintain said licenses warrants the employee's termination or demotion from said positions.

2. Levels Defined

The levels defined in this ordinance correspond to the number of years employed in that classification beginning with Level 1 equaling 0 to 1 years of service, Level 2 equaling 1 to 2 years of service; each level thereafter corresponding with the years of service in that classification, completed by the employee.

3. Probationary employees

All newly hired employees, with the exception of police officers, shall be deemed probationary employees and may be terminated without cause prior to the end of one year of service with the Village.

Police officers probationary period is defined in O.R.C. section 737.17 and shall be subject to termination as set forth in O.R.C. Chapter 737.

4. Full-time employee defined.

A full-time employee is defined as one who is regularly scheduled to work 30 hours or more per week in any capacity for the Village and is not a seasonal or temporary employee.

Section III: Beginning December 26, 2020, the compensation of employees of the Village of Covington working in the various departments shall be and hereby is fixed as shown below.




